The Seventh Annual Apologetics and Worldview Conference

"UNSURPASSED CHRISTIAN APOLOGISTS"

June 18-19, Bethany Lutheran College, Mankato Minnesota

This will be an amazing conference!

One of Christianity's most remarkable apologists and theologians, Dr. John Warwick Montgomery, died this last September at the age of 92. His legacy, along with that of C.S. Lewis and several other early Christian apologists, will be recognized. We will hear how they wisely and often simply defended Christianity and how the church of today can do the same. They stand on the shoulders of the supreme apologist, Jesus Christ, and his apostles who accompanied Jesus from the time of his baptism until the day when he was taken up from them—bestowing on them the unique and necessary mark of eyewitnesses of his resurrection (Acts 1:21-22).

The presenters are scholars and great communicators, able to connect with all, from the younger Christian to the learned theologian.

I. The Legacy of John Warwick Montgomery

(Presented by **trial lawyer Craig Parton**, who worked hand in hand with Montgomery for many years and has taken up his mantle of Director of the International Academy of Apologetics, Evangelism and Human Rights in Strasbourg, France)

II. The Legacy of C.S. Lewis

(Presented by Lutheran theologian and interim seminary president **Dr. Joel Heck**, a C.S. Lewis scholar, author of over 40 articles and five books on Lewis)

III. The Legacy of Early Christian Apologists

(Presented by **Dr. Adam Francisco** who earned his Ph.D. from the University of Oxford in the history of Christian apologetics; this topic is one of his specialties)

Funding Requested

Please bear with me as I make my way to the request for financial help. Throughout the centuries the Christian Church has provided a defense and evidence for the truth of Christianity. That's what the world "apologetics" means – a defense. Faith in Jesus Christ is not blind. Evidence for Christianity is amazing, overwhelming, and sets it apart from all other religions and worldviews. Apologetics was a key factor and emphasis in the early Christian Church. And it had to be: Christianity was a small fish swimming upstream against a flood of paganism, polytheism, and deceptive philosophies. The case had to be made for its truth and for its claims about the person and work of Jesus Christ. And at the same time the Church had to show how other religions and ways of thinking and living could never ever satisfy man's true and greatest needs. And so that's what early Christians did.

The Christian Church today is very similar. We live in a post-Christian culture. Some worldviews and ideologies have taken society by storm, despite the fact that they are not only deceptive but so disconnected from reality. And yet we find them promoted and embedded everywhere in culture, pushing true Christianity to the outskirts, and often taking Christians – young Christians – captive in the process. That is why CAW also focuses on worldviews: identifying and explaining in what ways they conflict with the truth of Christianity.

Apologetics and worldviews. That's what we do.

I invite you to support us in our efforts. At this time, we are the only biblical and confessional Lutheran church body to have both an apologetics board and an apologetics Center. You can support us in three ways. First, pray. Second, spread the word to others. And third, support us financially. We are self-supporting, dependent

on donations from people like you. Your first obligations are to your family and your church. But if you can and the extent to which you can, please support the Center for Apologetics and Worldviews. I invite you to donate regularly. If anyone would like to see how we handle our finances, we are more than willing to provide that info for you.

The apostles and many Christians in the early church were prepared to give a defense to anyone who asked them for the hope that was within them (1 Pet. 3:15). They also were to test the spirits so they would not be taken captive by hollow and deceptive worldviews that were not based on Christ (1 John 4:1; Col. 2:8). So, St. Paul reminds us of our unity as we strive together: "...you are all partakers with me of grace, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel." (Phil. 1:7)
