## The Legacy of the Early Apologists

- 1. The claim is often made that Christian apologetics is a modern development or a modernist activity.
- James K. A. Smith's Who's Afraid of Postmodernism
- Philip Kenneson, "There's No Such Thing as Objective Truth, and It's a Good Thing, Too," in *Christian Apologetics in the Postmodern World*
- 2. Modern apologists such as C.S. Lewis and John Warwick Montgomery were but two stellar examples of apologists/apologetics whose approach and disposition stretch way back to the New Testament era.
- Paul at Mars in Hill in Acts 17 and before Festus and Agrippa in Acts 25-26.
- These are biblical examples of what Peter meant in 1 Peter 3:15.
- 3. There is a tremendous history of Christian apologetics ever since the days of the apostles. A brief history of but a few:
- **To the Greco-Roman world**: Justin Martyr (c. 100-165), 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Apology
- **To Jews**: Justin Martyr, *Dialogue with Trypho the Jew*
- To Pagans: Augustine (354-430), City of God
- **To Muslims**: Theodore Abu Qurrah (c. 750-820)
- Medieval apologists: Anselm (1033-1109), Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274)
- **To the world**: Hugo Grotius (1583-1645), *On the Truth of the Christian Religion*
